




## Highest academic qualifications





An early exit refers to leaving our school before completing S.6.







#### Destinations of 2020 S.6 Graduates

For JUPAS, 140 students sat HKDSE Examination and 139 students enrolled in JUPAS application. 106 (76.3%) were given JUPAS offers and 96 (69.1%) were in degree courses. It is encouraging to see that 95.8% of our students are able to continue their studies in tertiary institutions.



## Major Concerns – Achievements and Reflections

#### 1. Student-centred Learning (SCL)

#### Achievements

Learning during the pandemic

In 2019 – 2020, classes in Hong Kong have been suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Most of the schools introduced online teaching methodologies to enable students to 'learn at home.' The implementation of e-learning and online learning has been indispensable. In addition to arousing schools', teachers' and students' awareness towards e-learning, the class suspension has also encouraged the use of online resource providers, as well as school and teacher sharing of online learning resources.

To provide quality education during the class suspension, all departments were requested to provide appropriate teaching, feedback and evaluation tools during this period. Our teaching staff made use of various resources to implement effective elearning.

To cater for the specific needs of different subjects, different departments made use of the most suitable learning systems for teaching in their subject area. Our School accepted a wide range of e-learning systems / teaching platforms - Google Classroom, e-Class Classroom, Microsoft Team, Edpuzzle and Edmodo as the Learning Management System (LMS); real time video conferencing systems like Zoom, Google Hangouts, Google Meet, Microsoft Team Streaming from Microsoft Team and Cisco Webex for providing real-time exchange of ideas and off-lesson discussion among students and between teachers and students. Socrative, Nearpod, Google Forms and Microsoft Forms were used in lesson preparation and learning and teaching evaluation. Self-directed learning platforms included Online Question Bank from HKEdCity and BrainPop for students' extended-learning. A co-teaching approach was also more widely adopted during this period of online teaching.

 Student-centred learning culture was implemented and enhanced in various academic departments.

The School is committed to nurturing self-directed, independent, lifelong learners. Through the provision of resources, guidance, the developing of learning skills and various strategies, students explore topics that stimulate their interest outside the classroom, cultivate an active learning atmosphere and develop themselves to be fervent learners.

Pedagogically, pre-lesson tasks and learning guides have been provided by academic departments to encourage students to explore the lesson content before they engage in discussions and learning tasks in class. Post-test analysis questioning and inquiring, collaborative learning and assessment in learning were adopted in teaching. Through various pedagogies, students were engaged in diverse learning activities and given ample opportunities for challenging their academic capacities. Cloud Knowledge Base

online platforms and reading corners on campus have become well-established and grown in utilization.

Teachers have been encouraged to share teaching experience. More inter- and intradepartmental peer lesson observations and post-lesson discussion sessions have been held. Peer evaluation has been implemented in various departments. 4 pilot teacher groups of SCL have been formed.

 In general, students have been able to produce quality projects in Project-based Learning (PBL). This has been especially conspicuous in the module of PBL-II of the Enrichment Course (EC).

On the whole, students' comments on their application of the skills, of which SDL is a part, learnt throughout the project has been positive. About 86.6% of them thought they were able to apply 5W2H skills in the brainstorming stage; many of them (95.9%) said they were able to apply concept mapping to narrow research topic choices and in data analysis. Most of them (94.8%) felt that they were able to apply problem-solving skills.

About 93.6% of students thought the information gathering skills learnt in PBL were useful for their future project work. Many of them (97.7%) agreed that the report writing skills learnt in PBL-II were useful to their future project work. Over 80% of students found the project planning skills as well as data organizing and analysing skills useful. The exact figures were 96.5% and 95.3% respectively.

- The Reading Fund from EDB was used efficiently to encourage reading. Reading lessons were introduced in S.1 and S.2 English lessons. A Reading Week was also launched.
- There were STREAM collaborations in curriculum design and student assessment framework. Facilities in the Geology and Climate Change Resource Centre, Cell Biotechnology Research Centre, Advanced Materials Research Centre and China Resource Centre were upgraded. Smart Campus facilities in various learning venues were also improved.

#### Reflections

- Teachers should continue to be encouraged to make good use of the learning management system (LMS) Google Classroom, Microsoft Team as online platforms for arranging lessons, conducting competency tests, tracking students' learning progress and performance, particularly if and when periods of class suspension occur in the future. More training and support will be given to this end.
- As the School moves to a remote learning environment, both students and teachers need more time and practice to adapt to new learning and teaching methods, and make remote learning increasingly effective and engaging.

• If the pandemic continues, more independent learning is expected. Students' study skills such as note-taking, critical thinking, effective reading, time management, quality discussion and presentation, etc., should be further sharpened.

#### 2. Healthy School Life (HSL)

#### **Achievements**

 The Healthy School Life Team reiterated the three major areas, namely Physical Health, Mental Health and Social Well-being, to help students develop a good and healthy school life.

Workshops and talks were arranged to strengthen students in these three areas. Positive feedback was received from teachers and students. Students understood more about the needs of different people. Alertness to their work-life balance was aroused.

Book sharing and experience sharing on healthy lifestyle was done by teachers during Morning Assemblies.

 Special sanitization arrangements against COVID-19 were carried out on the whole campus before class resumption. There was close checking of body temperature of both teachers and students. Reminders for seasonal infectious diseases were issued regularly through different channels.

- Fitness lessons were held during P.E. lessons and after school.
- Healthy School Ambassadors were not recruited and the Healthy School Day was cancelled due to the pandemic situation.

#### Reflections

- Students' knowledge about nutrition and sports should be further developed to enrich their knowledge of health issues and the relationship between health and sports.
- More promotion should be done to increase students' awareness before activities are held.
- More Healthy School Ambassadors, especially from S.1, should be recruited to encourage these younger students to participate more actively in health courses.
- More peripheral facilities should be constructed to encourage greater participation in school fitness programmes.

#### 3. Global Awareness (GAP)

#### **Achievements**

- This year, our school emphasized student initiative in promoting global awareness through organizing various activities for their schoolmates. House committees organized game booths with 17 sustainable development goals for all students. Over 200 students participated enthusiastically in the event and the feedback was very positive. Externally, over 30 students participated in activities organized by other organizations. In short, all junior-form students participated in at least 2 cultural activities while all senior-form students played an active role in organizing at least 1 activity. Over 300 students attended talks on topics related to global awareness. At least 7 sharing events on global awareness were conducted to the whole school during morning assemblies.
- The Global Awareness Team organized and arranged talks on cattle raising in Africa and future innovative business opportunities and essential soft skills for junior and senior form students respectively.
- In addition, the Global Awareness Team also arranged 3 different workshops in November and December 2019 to improve students understanding on fair trade and South Asian food.
- A Global Awareness Programme Award Scheme was successfully introduced and sustained. A total of 50 students received Bronze, Silver and Gold awards in appreciation of their enthusiastic participation in global awareness activities despite the pandemic situation which lasted throughout the second term.

- Most of the departments and teams incorporated global awareness into their curriculums and activities.
- A good relationship with our sister schools, Shanghai Nanyang High School and Tsinglan School, was maintained. The possibility of further developing networks with other schools in the mainland and other countries will be considered.
- Sustainable development (SD) continued to be a core idea in junior-form subjects. The Project-based Learning module in S.1 and S.2, for instance, adopted SD as the theme of students' projects.
- There were different posts uploaded on the school's cloud knowledge base platform to arouse students' awareness about recent global issues.
- Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all planned school activities and exchange programmes as well as education tours in the second term were cancelled.

#### Reflections

- We will continue to promote global awareness through the use of different channels such as, morning assemblies, posters, campus TV promotion and school emails even during school suspension periods.
- We will develop connections with schools/organizations of various countries in the world even when physical travelling is not possible.
- We will initiate Global Ambassadors to organize activities related to global awareness for other students to participate.
- Should COVID-19 continue, physical experience of life in overseas countries will be hampered. The approach of implementing GAP will necessarily be modified.

## Support for Student Development

1. New S.1 Students to CFSS

Each year, a new cohort of 175 S.1 students enter CFSS. To help them adapt to the new school environment, a two-week Bridging Course was planned. This course was condensed to one week due to COVID-19 and held through an online platform from 17 to 21 August 2020. The first day was composed of 3 sessions. These included a student support session, creativity workshop on invention and a creative drawing workshop, followed by a 4-day academically-oriented (English Language training) programme to enable the new cohort to adapt to the EMI secondary school curriculum.

2. Training for student leaders

Each Student Support Team gave training to students with duties to enhanse their ability in doing their routine and ad hoc duties. The Discipline Team ran two training sessions for all

prefects (30 Sept and 19 Oct 2019). Besides these, there were other training sessions: one given to all Head Prefects and Prefect Leaders on 14 Oct 2019; workshops for peer counsellors organized by the Counselling Team and Student Ambassador training on ad hoc basis for large-scale school functions, e.g. S.1 Information Days, Open Day.

#### 3. Other Learning Experiences

Every CFSS student can join at least one education tour organized by the school during their six years of studies, regardless of the financial background of their families. However, in 2019-20, all education tours were cancelled due to the outbreak of COVID-19.

#### 4. Promoting Positive Values through Different Student Support Teams

With a view to instilling positive core values into students, the Moral & Civic Education Team collaborates with other teams to organise rich and diversified enhancement programmes. In 2019-20, we particularly stressed five priority values: perseverance, respecting others, responsibility, national identity and commitment. The table below is a summary of the activities held by the Team in the last academic year:

4 students participated in a moral & civic education programme ("傑出公民學生獎勵計劃 2019/20"). In this programme, they were trained to be excellent citizens of the community. One of them received the honour of "十優大使."

Besides, the Sex Education Team paid special effort into helping students respect each other, building a positive attitude towards sexuality and acquiring an appropriate knowledge about sexual issues. Last year, the Team organized ECSAF Sex Education Program for S.1, S.4 and S.5 and positive self-image and sex traps through mobile devices is arranged for S.2 and S.3 students respectively. The Discipline Team adopted different strategies to train students to abide by the school rules. 51 students received Merits of Conduct, which was enforceable in the first term only, as awards to their commendable conduct.

5. Continuous support on career & life planning for our students

To strengthen students' sense of career planning and management, a total of 17 Personal & Growth Education (PGE) lessons were designed and conducted by Career & Life Planning Team and Class teachers. Regular evaluations by teachers and students were conducted to collect their opinions and make improvements to the PGE lesson design for the next academic year.

Besides, a total of 4 talks were conducted for parents and students to provide up-to-date information on career and life planning and further studies.

An S.3 Subject streaming consultation was held successfully for our students to guide their future planning. In addition, more than 30 consultation hours (both individual and group) were allocated to S.6 students for career counselling. In addition, 167 S.3 students received career counselling before their subject streaming.

Due to school suspension, only 602 participants from S.1 to S.6 joined in various CLP-related talks and activities organized by different organizations.
