


Highest academic qualifications

3 staff development days were planned in the last academic year 2020-21. About 15 interaction hours of in-house training were provided.






Early exit rate







Destinations of 2021 S.6 Graduates

For JUPAS, 110 students sat HKDSE Examination and 109 students enrolled in JUPAS application. 99 (90.8%) were given JUPAS offers and 87 (79.8%) were in degree courses. It is encouraging to see that 97.3% of our students are able to continue their studies in tertiary institutions.



Major Concerns – Achievements and Reflections

1. Student-centred Learning (SCL)

Achievements

- The rationale of this year's major concern was to continuously uphold excellence in teaching and learning and to cater for the needs of students. Over the period of suspension of face-to-face classes, learning and teaching was sustained as far as possible. The extended academic support disseminated outside regular classroom via various e-platforms allowing students to enhance their SCL.
- Each class has their own Google Classroom. All teaching materials including notes, assignments, extensive reading were uploaded to Google Classroom. In addition, extra exercises were provided and public examination questions were accessible online. All students were able to access these materials at any time for review throughout the year.

Because of the suspension of face-to-face classes, a wide range of e-learning & teaching platforms - Google Classroom, e-Class Classroom, Microsoft Team, Edpuzzle, Socrative, Kahoot, Jamboard, Padlet and Edmodo were used as part of the Learning Management System (LMS). Real-time video conferencing systems like Zoom, Google Hangouts, Google Meet, Microsoft Team Streaming from Microsoft Team and Cisco Webex were continuously adopted to provide and improve online teaching quality through a real-time exchange of ideas and off-lesson discussions among students and between teachers and students.

- The CFSS Cloud Knowledge Base is an online platform for teachers to share useful texts
 and other information to students for self-directed learning and extensive reading
 opportunities. The promotion of the CFSS Cloud Knowledge Base as a learning resource
 bank was aimed at encouraging more autonomy in learning.
- Classroom activities, such as debate, forum, role play, group discussion and presentations, were conducted during lessons. Students were encouraged to construct their own working plan and learning strategies and, at times, need to do presentations in class. Peer evaluations were also widely adopted to help students reflect on their strengths and weaknesses. They also did this as part of peer evaluation. This enabled them to support each other and share opinions. They were also able to make comparisons and learn from each other's strengths and mistakes.
- Various academic departments, including Chinese Language, English Language, Mathematics, Liberal Studies, Science, Chemistry, Biology and History, uploaded videos to the online learning platform to help students to take greater ownership of their learning, as well as to stimulate their learning motivation. Students could pace themselves, work with, and revisit pre-lesson learning materials that are catered to their individual needs.
- 5 thematic book exhibitions, covering different topics, were held in 2020-2021. These
 helped arouse students' interest and trained them to use books for reference in doing
 homework and projects.

- Our school was invited by the Life-wide Learning Section of the Education Bureau to share our experience in promoting STREAM and Robotics Education in a Professional Development Programme. We also cultivate values. Our teachers work hard with the goal of helping students achieve a high standard of learning, develop their self-esteem, confidence and commitment to personal excellence. Opportunities to develop in these areas also included exchange visits with local schools on the themes of STREAM and Sustainable Development Education.
- Our teachers were invited as guest speakers to conduct a sharing session on the topic
 of "Promoting Biodiversity Education through Experiential Learning Activities at STREAM
 Approach in the Teachers' Professional Sharing Month 2021. This sought to establish
 professional communities of teachers by demonstrating good teaching practices to the
 territory. The topic was related to the whole-school approach of fostering STREAM
 Education in CFSS and the details of implementing a CEATE Biodiversity Education
 framework.
- CFSS has been recognized by the Education Bureau as an awarding school in the Wise NET School Recognition Scheme 2020 for our continuous effort in promoting Information Literacy and in the effective use of the network resources to aid students. Students have been trained to turn their mobile phone into an educational tool. They have also been led to understand the importance of using the Internet wisely and critically evaluating the quality of online resources. Thus technology is seen as an integral part of developing critical thinking.

Reflections

- Departments should make full use of both the Google Classroom and CFSS Cloud Knowledge Base to encourage students across different levels to learn beyond classroom.
- Through pre-lesson previews and post-lesson revision tasks, most students have formed a habit of lesson preview and taking greater initiative in self learning. They have become more motivated and are on a better trajectory in becoming life-long learners. Peer evaluation has facilitated student learning as students reflect on their own performance and their peers. Peer evaluation has also helped established a more harmonious network among students.
- Students' study skills such as note-taking, critical thinking, effective reading, time
 management, quality discussion and presentation, etc., should be further sharpened and
 collaborative learning skills honed.
- The experience-sharing of effective pedagogy and innovative teaching ideas among departments has been clearly beneficial for both students and teachers.

2. Healthy School Life (HSL)

Achievements

 To help students develop good habits and a healthy school life, the Health School Life (HSL) Team continues to focus on three main areas: Physical Health, Mental Health and Social Wellbeing.

Besides workshops and talks to strengthen students in these three areas, the HSL Team has recruited Health Ambassadors. to convey messages on health. The Ambassadors achieved this target by developing a stronger sense of a healthy school life among students. They helped their peers maintain a healthy classroom environment and introduced the idea of "eating green & living green".

- Our school has adhered closely to the updated protection guidelines issued by the EDB and the Centre for Health Protection in August 2020 and April 2021. Special sanitization arrangements against COVID-19 have continued. Reminders for seasonal infectious diseases have been issued regularly through different channels. Students have maintained a strong sense of responsibility in preventing a viral outbreak. As of August 2021, over 90% of the staff have received vaccination. Among students, the rate of receiving vaccination has been increasing.
- Our school has successfully applied for a Dedicated Funding Programme for Publicly-funded Schools sponsored by the Quality Education Fund to promote "Smart Healthy School Life" (Project No. 2019/0709). Precise digital multi-function body fat meters and jump training devices will be installed in the G/F Covered Playground and gymnasium. The optimized use of high-end fitness equipment such as multifunctional digital sports training equipment, multi-angle tensile trainer devices, Fitlight response training system will all enhance the participation of teachers and students promoting a culture in the school of working towards physical and mental health.

Reflections

- Students' knowledge about nutrition and sports should be further developed to enrich their knowledge of health issues and the relationship between health and sports.
- More health promotion and instructions should be given to students to increase their awareness before activities are held. Moreover, students and staff are encouraged to receive vaccination whenever appropriate.
- More Health Ambassadors, especially from S.1, should be recruited to encourage younger students to participate more actively in health courses.
- More students should be motived to conduct health training independently with the help of advanced gymnastic equipment and smart phones.

3. Global Awareness (GAP)

<u>Achievements</u>

- Last year, the following activities were held: Fair Trade Exhibition and Game Booths, gift donation to ethnic minorities and refugees, United Nations Polling Activity, United Nations Polling Introductory Course, Draw for Peace & Calligraphy for Peace by UNESCO, 2021 "My Interfaces with the Belt and Road Initiative," Integrated Ability Competition and International Hong Kong Model United Nations Conference, together with other workshops on Cultural Days and during the post-examination period.
- With decreasing activities, the GAP Team consolidated students' ideas on GAP by uploading useful articles about global issues to Google Classroom, e.g., the United Nations Introductory Course and Fair Trade articles.
- Most of the departments and teams have continued to incorporate global awareness into their curriculums and activities.
- For extensive reading, all junior-form students have been encouraged to read books on global awareness during their Reading Period. Finally, 13 students successfully attained the related awarded through a GAP award scheme. As for cultural activities, all S.1 to S.3 students joined at least one cultural activity, totalling 1793 student-times.
- Sustainable development (SD) has continued to be a core idea in junior-form subjects.
 The Project-based Learning module in S.1 and S.2, for instance, has adopted SD as the theme of students' projects.
- Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, education tours have been suspended. Even a teachers' planned visit to Tsinglan School was cancelled. Yet, a Pen Friend Programme and a session of video-conferencing with our sister school, Shanghai Nanyang High School, were able to take place. Teachers and students of both schools recalled how happy they were with the athletic achievements in the Olympic Games and shared about how they have coped with the new living style under the pandemic situation.

Reflections

- The Global Awareness Programme Award Scheme took place during the academic year. However, the number of awardees dropped significantly due to the suspension of face-to-face lessons. This programme promotes social responsibility. Students will be encouraged to shoulder more responsibilities in service to the community, especially towards deprived and disadvantaged groups.
- Physical experience of life in overseas countries will be hampered. The approach of implementing GAP will necessarily be modified.

Support for Student Development

New S.1 Students and Rollling Applicants to CFSS

Each year, a new cohort of 175 S.1 students enter CFSS. To help them adapt to the new school environment, a two-week Bridging Course takes place. The course was condensed to eight days of face-to-face classes from 11 to 20 August, 2021. The first three days included a student support session, ICT training, a creative drawing workshop and a meeting with the Counselling Team & Social Workers, followed by a 5-day academically-oriented (English Language training) programme to enable the new cohort to adapt well to the EMI learning environment.

From this year onward, 2 phases of rolling admission will be arranged every year. This year 18 new students were admitted (5 in the 2nd term of the previous academic year and 13 in the following term). Each group of new students received an orientation, followed by an introduction to the School Prinicpal, their Class Teachers and other senior teachers. Particular attention was given to new S.2 students who would soon be engaged in Project-based Learning with a project group and a project supervisor.

2. Training for student leaders

Each Student Support Team gives training to students with duties to enhance their ability in doing their routine and ad hoc duties. The Discipline Team ran three training sessions for all prefects (3 Oct, 17 Oct 2020 and 12 Mar 2021). The Counselling Team added to this with a training day camp and the Mindfulness Training Workshop with Peer Counsellors.

3. Other Learning Experiences

Every CFSS student can join at least one education tour organized by the school during their six years of studies. Funding is provided to enable each student to go regardless of the financial background of their familiy. However, in 2020-21, all education tours were cancelled due to the outbreak of COVID-19.

The Careers & Life Planning Team organized a series of talks for different levels to provide guidance whatever path a student might choose.

A year-round online training event for parents, titled "Joyful Parents Programme", was organised by the Counselling Team. Four talks were held: two in October and November of 2020 and another two in May and June 2021. Famous parent educationalists, such as Dr. Chan Pak On and Dr. Hui Na Na Anna, were invited as speakers.

In addition, the Sex Education Team paid special attention to helping students respect each other. They sought to build a positive attitude towards sexuality in the school and also help students acquire appropriate knowledge about sexual issues. Last year, the Team organized 3 talks and 2 PGE lessons. The Discipline Team adopted different strategies to train students to be cooperative, helpful and abide by the school rules. 246 students received Merits of Conduct while 35 students received the Conduct Prize which commends praiseworthy behaviour.

Celebration of 20th Anniversary

The Celebration of 20th Anniversary kicked off with a 20th Anniversary Exhibition cum Open Day held on 16 October 2020. The theme was "20 Years of Quality Education and the Way Forward". Professor Yuk-Shan Wong, BA, MSc, PhD, FSB, FHKIS, SBS, BBS, JP, President of The Open University of Hong Kong, kindly officiated at the Opening Ceremony. A variety of exhibits and workshops helped guests gain a better understanding of how the school educates in and beyond the classroom.

A 20th Anniversary Community Service Project was accomplished which served 20 groups of people in Hong Kong. Those cared for included the blind, the street-sleepers, the handicapped, senior citizens, peace lovers and other unprivileged persons. In May, two publications, viz. 20th Anniversary Photo Album and School Magazine Vol. 4 were issued. A detailed chronology of CFSS since its inception was provided to provide precious memories to current and past students.

Due to the interruption by the pandemic, only the 20th Anniversary Exhibition cum Open Day and 20th Anniversary Community Service Project were completed. The Long Service Award Presentation and 20th Anniversary Commemorative Video, the 20th Anniversary Dinner and Anniversary Variety Show are still in the pipeline and are scheduled to be completed in the 2021-2022 School Year.
